THE CLUB

FOUNDED IN 1890



The Flensburger Segel-Club (FSC) is one of the oldest and most traditional yacht clubs in Germany with a long tradition in racing and cruising. In cooperation with its neighbour the Hanseatische Yachtschule it runs a beautiful marina which has only recently been elected as the most beautiful coastal marina in Germany.

The club has gained a remarkable reputation as organizer of regional and international regattas for all kinds of boats from seagoing yachts to various Olympic and international dinghy-classes. In 2003 the FSC organized the International German Championship of all Olympic classes (IDM). Moreover it hosted the International German Championship Offshore in 1998, 2001, 2006, 2009 and the ORCi Worlds in 2010 as well as the World Championships for the 5.5m in 2001, of the 12mR in 2008, the Robbe & Berking 12mR World Championship and the Robbe & Berking 8mR World Championship in 2011 and the European Championships of the 8mR and 6mR Class in 2005 and 2006. In 2013 the Club celebrated the 100th anniversary of its legendary “Flensburger Förde Woche” which every autumn attracts many of Germany’s elite of Offshore Sailors to finish their season on the Flensburg Fjord.

The club is situated in Glücksburg/Ostsee a seaside resort 12 km east of Flensburg. It has 710 members of whom 240 own a boat.

THE CLUB

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The FSC- Clubhouse has just recently been renovated and offers room for more than 200 guests. Ceremony facilities for opening and closing are available outside- as well inside the building. The “Bootshalle” is well known and legendary as party location after racing. An excellent restaurant in the FSC- Clubhouse meets all needs concerning catering. Several chandlers are at hand in nearby Flensburg and will be represented on the sight. A supermarket is app. 1 km away, a swimming hall with extended wellness facilities only 500 m, as well as a beach for swimming and different snack bars.

The clubhouse hosts an extra room for the race-office, run by a very experienced crew. The Race-Organizing Team of the FSC is professionally trained. It consists of 40 steady members and many motivated volunteers if needed. A special room of considerable size can be offered as press office. Interviewing space can be provided as well as facilities for skippers meetings. Free W-LAN is available on the grounds. The FSC is attached to the “mange2sail.com” platform assuring fast availability of all information including results. Change rooms, for men and women separately, showers and toilets are attached to the club-house. Additional mobile toilet- and shower units will be installed during the championship.

THE AREA

BEAUTIFUL PLACE TO SAIL



Races are sailed on the Flensburg Fjord and out into the Little Belt and the waters of the Danish South Sea. This area is one of the most beautiful to sail in. Formed during the ice-ages, the fjord reaches a length of 35 km between the Kalkgrund Lighthouse in the east and Flensburg at its western end. The peninsula Holnis divides the area into an inner- and an outer fjord. The fjord marks the border between Denmark and Germany: the northern shore belongs to Denmark, while the southern shore belongs to Germany. Nowadays there is hardly any commercial traffic on the fjord so that sailors remain undisturbed. Many of them consider Flensburg an ideal starting point for trips to the Danish archipelago.

THE REGION

FLensburg & GLÜCKSBURG



Flensburg is located in the uppermost north of Germany next to the Danish border. Its 88.000 inhabitants make it the third largest town in Schleswig-Holstein. Flensburg is the commercial heart of northern Schleswig-Holstein. It is also the cultural heart of its hinterland serving more than 400.000 people, both Germans and Danes. Due to the large proportion of Danish inhabitants Flensburg offers a much wider variety of cultural activities than other towns of similar in size. At night the city comes alive with a great mix of bars and restaurants ranging from bistros to traditional Italian, there's something to suit all tastes.

Beautifully restored historic buildings and warehouses from the 18th century are a reminiscence of Flensburg's past glory, when the town was home port of one of the largest Danish merchant fleets. The ships set off for the Caribbean to return with a cargo of sugar canes, which were needed to produce rum. Flensburg's former reputation as a 'rum-town' dated back to that time. Sadly, the industry has recently ceased to exist...

The little town of Glücksburg where the FSC is located is a charming little seaside resort that is well known as the "cradle" of European aristocracy. The medieval Glücksburg Castle still reminds of that time.
